**WEEKLY NEWSLETTER**

**1. State Grant Funds Received by FWIB to Place Vets into High-Demand Jobs:**

The Foothill Workforce Investment Board (FWIB) was one of only ten agencies throughout the State to be awarded funding from the California Employment Development Department (EDD) to transition veterans into high-demand jobs and careers. Each agency was awarded \$400,000 through a competitive process. According to Pam Harris, Director of EDD, "This funding will build upon the valuable skills, and experiences our veterans have gained from their service to this nation, and provide them with the tools necessary to transition from military life into high-wage civilian jobs."

According to William K. Huang, Housing Director, the FWIB will focus their efforts on those who have recently separated from the military, campaign veterans, those with special barriers, and female veterans. The anticipated program performance period is 18-24 months, with a start date no earlier than June 1, 2013 and an end date no later than June 30, 2015.

**2. Hahamongna Watershed Park – Southern California Edison Maintenance Activities:**

In May 2013, Southern California Edison (SCE) performed and grading and brush maintenance activities to maintain access to power poles and associated facilities located within Hahamongna Watershed Park (HWP.) SCE undertakes maintenance activities on an annual basis pursuant to the attached Grant of Easement dated September 17, 1948. Based on City observations made at the conclusion of this year's work, Department of Public Works representatives met with SCE to review concerns which are outlined in the attached memorandum from Siobhan Foster, Director of Public Works. The Department of Public Works will continue its dialogue with SCE and provide updates as resolution of the current matter progresses and information about future SCE maintenance and/or remediation work is available.

**3. Arroyo Seco Adventure Camp Receives \$400,000 Grant from the State of California:**

Mercy Santoro, Director of the Human Services and Recreation Department, is proud to announce receipt of a grant in the amount of \$400,000 from the State of California's Habitat Conservation Fund Program for a specialized nature camp.

The proposed Arroyo Seco Adventure Camp will be a full-day, weekly nature camp for children that will be located in the City's Arroyo Seco Park. The Arroyo Seco Park is the largest and most biologically and geographically diverse park in the City and supports several different plant communities and hundreds of wildlife species. The new camp will be held for four summers (up to ten weeks in duration each summer) and may accommodate approximately 100 school age youth weekly. This camp will allow children to experience the natural setting of the Arroyo Seco and learn their own potential for protecting its important plant and wildlife habitats. A series of activities are planned including archery, fly-casting, horseback riding, teambuilding, hiking day trips and education activities. The attached memorandum provides additional detailed information on the Arroyo Seco Adventure Camp program.

**4. Pasadena Public Library Staff Innovation Pitch an Idea Grants Totaling \$26,500:**

Pasadena Public Library is proud and pleased to announce that all of the Staff Innovation Pitch an Idea Grants proposed by Pasadena Library Staff to the California State Library were successful and received funding. The attached memorandum from Jan Sanders, Director of Libraries and Information Services, provides detailed information on each programs funding and those who participated in assisting in the process.

**5. Metro Diamond Awards:**

The Department of Transportation is pleased to announce that the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) awarded the City of Pasadena the 2013 Blue Diamond Award. The Blue Diamond Award is awarded by Metro each year to the corporation or agency with the most outstanding employee rideshare program. The City's employee rideshare program, known as the Prideshare Program, has been recognized by Metro in previous years but took the top award for Los Angeles County this year. Vice Mayor Robinson attended the awards event and was presented the Blue Diamond Award with Oskar Molina and Nina Chen who operate the Prideshare Program. I have attached a memorandum from Frederick C. Dock, Director of Transportation which provides additional information on the City's Prideshare Program.

**6. Careers in Conservation:**

The Careers in Conservation Program will kick off Tuesday, July 2, 2013 with 16 students who currently attend Muir High School's Career Pathways Science, Technology and Engineering Academy. Together the City of Pasadena, Summer Rose Program and the County of Los Angeles Summer Youth Employment Program have created a paid educational opportunity for youth to obtain valuable on the job training through the "Careers and Conservation Program". This project also supports the portion of the School/City Workplan

which focuses on the School to Career Program. I have attached a memorandum from Lisa Fowler, Management Analyst IV, Human Services and Recreation which provides additional detailed information on this program.

7. **“Seabiscuit” Themed Art Work at the Armory Center Features Work of Adaptive Recreation Participants:**

Special “Seabiscuit” themed artwork created by adults with disabilities will be on display from July 13 to Sept. 7, 2013 at the Armory Center for the Arts, 145 N. Raymond Ave. The public is also invited to attend an opening reception for the artists, who are enrolled in Pasadena’s Adaptive Recreation Art Program, from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 13 at the Armory Center. The attached memorandum from Mercy Santoro, Director of Human Services and Recreation provides additional information on this year’s theme.

8. **Parks & Natural Resources – Tree Removal List:**

The attached list from Siobhan Foster, Director of Public Works, highlights pending removals of dead, dying and hazardous trees on a non-emergency basis throughout Pasadena, as well as trees recently removed on an emergency basis. The Parks & Natural Resources Division has posted the non-emergency removals and notified pertinent residents consistent with the City’s Tree Removal Policy.

9. **Advertisements Promoting Pasadena as a Leisure Destination:**

Attached for your review is a correspondence from Janet Zaldua, Director of Marketing & Communications, Pasadena Convention & Visitors Bureau which provides some recent advertisements promoting Pasadena as a leisure destination that are being featured this summer in major publications.

10. **Van Nuys Airport Runway Closure:**

The City Manager received a letter from Maggie Martinez, Manager, Noise & Environmental Compliance with the Burbank-Bob Hope Airport making the City aware of the Van Nuys Airport issuing a 24-hour full runway closure for a 10-day period beginning on July 17, 2013 to accommodate their Runway Improvement Project.

The Burbank-Bob Hope airport is expecting Aircraft operations to temporarily relocate to Bob Hope Airport for this time period along with all other affected dates as shown in the attached Runway Closure Calendar. **MEMORANDUM - CITY OF PASADENA**

**RE:** Hahamongna Watershed Park – Southern California Edison Maintenance Activities

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In May 2013, Southern California Edison (SCE) performed grading and brush maintenance activities to maintain access to power poles and associated facilities located within Hahamongna Watershed Park (HWP.) SCE undertakes maintenance activities on an annual basis pursuant to the attached Grant of Easement dated September 17, 1948. Based on City observations made at the conclusion of this year's work, Department of Public Works representatives met with SCE to review the following concerns:

1. SCE did not provide the City with advance notice of this work nor did SCE receive the required approval from the City to commence work as required by the Grant of Easement. The City requested SCE provide the requisite advance notification of future work to ensure interested agencies have the opportunity to review SCE's planned scope and location of work within HWP.
2. SCE performed work outside the easement area and disturbed natural habitat. The City expressed the need for clearer indications of easement area boundaries and requested SCE provide maps needed to document easement boundaries.
3. SCE discarded vegetation that it cut as part of brush maintenance and grading activities adjacent to natural areas rather than collecting and removing the debris from the site for disposal. The City has made clear that this practice is improper and must not occur in the future.
4. HWP is a sensitive habitat area with abundant wildlife. SCE performed the recent brush maintenance and grading activities during bird nesting season. The City asked SCE to provide information regarding what environmental review it conducted prior to initiation of the work. Such advance review may include biological surveys and monitoring, wetland delineation, nesting bird and vegetation monitoring reports, and consultation with the California Department of Fish and Game (CDFG). The City also asked SCE to change the time of year it conducts these activities within HWP to avoid nesting season.

Outcomes from the City's meetings with SCE include the following:

1. SCE will contact the City at least two (2) weeks in advance of initiation of any future maintenance activities within HWP. Charles Peretz, Public Works Administrator will be the City's designated contact person.
2. City will uphold the easement requirements that SCE notify and receive City approval before initiating future vegetation removal/trimming within HWP.
3. Prior to initiation of future maintenance activities, City and SCE representatives will field review proposed maintenance area(s), planned equipment use, and explore ways to minimize impacts to the adjacent environment.
4. City will be responsible for future maintenance of overflow parking lot.
5. SCE will begin future maintenance activities south of the overflow lot and within its easement area.
6. SCE will remediate the area east of the easement boundary where vegetation management and grading created a disturbance by re-establishing plants in accordance with a City-approved plant species list in fall 2013.
7. SCE will assess the need for debris removal from HWP on an annual basis even though its typical procedure does not include the removal/disposal of vegetation cut during its maintenance activities. If there are large quantities, SCE will remove debris from the site and dispose.
8. SCE will continue to perform vegetation/line clearing activities prior to nesting season. These specific activities are conducted in the presence of a biological monitor at all times. Other operational crews, such as grading crews, will be advised of any applicable environmental requirements and the need to notify the City of any reviews undertaken prior to the initiation of work.
9. SCE will be performing additional vegetation management/grading necessary to re-establish access to a power pole located southeast of the equestrian staging area, in the southern section of HWP. This work will result in the disturbance of existing vegetation

The City will continue its dialogue with SCE about the disclosure and environmental review appropriate for its maintenance activities within HWP. As part of the ongoing dialogue, the City will explore the accuracy of SCE's statements, and discuss with SCE any applicable requirements of the Pasadena Municipal Code (PMC), as well as compliance with the easement terms requiring City approval prior to vegetation removal. If appropriate, the dialogue will also cover consequences for violation of the PMC and/or terms of the easement.

GRANT OF EASEMENT

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For Valuable Consideration, the CITY OF PASADENA, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as Grantor, does hereby grant to the SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY, a corporation, hereinafter called Grantee, an easement to construct, use, maintain, alter, add to, repair, replace, inspect, and remove an electric line consisting of poles, towers, necessary guys and guy stubs, anchors, cross-arms, wires and other fixtures and appliances, for conveying electric energy to be used for light, heat, power, telephone, and other purposes, over, under, and upon that certain real property in the City of Pasadena, County of Los Angeles, State of California, described as follows:

PARCEL 1 - A strip of land 20 feet wide lying within Lot 5 in Block 13 of Flintridge as per map recorded in Book 26, pages 23 to 33 of Maps in the office of the County Recorder of said County, the center line of said strip being described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the center line of La Canada Verdugo Road, as said center line is described in Resolution No. 6511 of the Board of Directors of the City of Pasadena, a certified copy of said Resolution being recorded in Book 12576, page 184 of Official Records of said County which point is South 69° 44' 00" East 161.75 feet from the Northwesterly terminus of that certain course in said center line which is described in said Resolution as having a bearing of North 69° 44' West, and a length of 462.81 feet; thence South 51° 52' 10" West 290 feet, more or less, to a point in the center line of Highland Drive, as said street is now established, 60 feet wide, over and across said Block 13 of Flintridge.

Beginning at said Point "K" in the center line of the hereinbefore described Parcel 2, thence North  $66^{\circ} 18' 10''$  West 60 feet.

PARCEL 8 - A strip of land 4 feet wide lying within said Lot 2 of Subdivisions of the Rancho La Canada, the center line of said strip being described as follows:

Beginning at said Point "L" in the center line of the hereinbefore described Parcel 2, thence North  $65^{\circ} 57' 44''$  West 60 feet.

PARCEL 9 - A strip of land 4 feet wide lying partly within said Lot 1 of Subdivisions of the Rancho La Canada and partly within the San Pascual Rancho, the center line of said strip being described as follows:

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Beginning at said Point "M" in the center line of the hereinbefore described Parcel 2; thence South 58° 27' 56" East 60 feet.

PARCEL 10 - A strip of land 4 feet wide lying within Government Lot 5 in Fractional Section 5, Township 1 North, Range 12 West, S.B.M., the center line of said strip being described as follows:

Beginning at said Point "N" in the center line of the hereinbefore described Parcel 4, thence North 47° 44' 55" East 60 feet.

PARCEL 11 - A strip of land 4 feet wide lying partly within Lot 35 of Altadena Map No. 3 as per map recorded in Book 52, page 50 of Miscellaneous Records in the office of said County Recorder and partly within the land shown on Map of a Tract of Land owned by L. W. Giddings recorded in Book 5, pages 106 and 107 of Miscellaneous Records in the office of said County Recorder, the center line of said strip being described as follows:

Beginning at said Point "O" in the center line of the hereinbefore described Parcel 5, thence South 45° 19' 55" West 60 feet.

Grantor reserves the right to use said property for park purposes and any other purposes not inconsistent with the use of said easement by the Grantee.

Grantee agrees not to remove or trim any brush or trees on said property without the approval of the Chief Engineer and General Manager of the Water Department of the City of Pasadena.

Grantee shall have the right of ingress to and egress from said easement across property of Grantor for the purpose of using the easement granted.

Grantee, its successors and assigns, upon receipt of notice from the Grantor, agrees to relocate on said easement or on adjoining lands of Grantor to the satisfaction of the Grantor any structure maintained or controlled by Grantee on said easement when such structure interferes with the Grantor's use of said property. Such relocation shall be made within a reasonable time after receipt of said notice by Grantee and such removal shall be commenced within ninety (90) days after receipt of such notice. The notice required hereby shall be sufficient if placed in the United States mail and addressed to the Southern California Edison Company, 601 West Fifth Street, Los Angeles, California.

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Grantee shall at all times save and hold harmless Grantor, its Board of Directors, officers, agents, employees, successors and assigns from and against all claims, demands, loss, damage and liability arising or growing out of loss or damage to property or injury to or death of persons resulting in any manner whatsoever directly or indirectly by reason of the use of said easement by Grantee.

Grantee shall be liable to Grantor for any damage which may occur to the property hereinbefore described or any structures placed thereon by Grantor arising out of the use of the easement hereby granted.

The covenants and conditions herein stated shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the respective successors and assigns of Grantor and Grantee.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CITY OF PASADENA AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A GRANT OF EASEMENT TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY AND REPEALING RESOLUTION NO. 7390.

**SUBJECT:** **Arroyo Seco Adventure Camp receives \$400,000 grant from the State of California**

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Mercy Santoro, Director of the Human Services and Recreation Department, is proud to announce receipt of a grant in the amount of \$400,000 from the State of California's Habitat Conservation Fund Program for a specialized nature camp.

The proposed Arroyo Seco Adventure Camp will be a full-day, weekly nature camp for children that will be located in the City's Arroyo Seco Park. The Arroyo Seco Park is the largest and most biologically and geographically diverse park in the City and supports several different plant communities and hundreds of wildlife species. The new camp will be held for four summers (up to ten weeks in duration each summer) and may accommodate approximately 100 school age youth weekly. This camp will allow children to experience the natural setting of the Arroyo Seco and learn their own potential for protecting its important plant and wildlife habitats. A series of activities are planned including archery, fly-casting, horseback riding, teambuilding, hiking day trips and education activities.

"The camp is one of the first accomplishments of the recently adopted School/City Work Plan. The curriculum focuses on Science, Technology, Engineer, Arts and Math (STEAM). Concepts promoted by the School District, including 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learning, and Project Based Learning, are all aspects of the camp. "Most importantly, creating an appreciation for the outdoors and instilling a value for conservation are important developmental experiences our campers will receive," said Mercy Santoro, Director of Human Services and Recreation.

Grant funds will be used for startup costs associated with developing this comprehensive program and for scholarships. The development of this program was a direct result of the community needs assessment conducted by the Department in 2012 through which many residents expressed a desire for more outdoor education and sustainability recreation programs. Ms. Santoro would like to acknowledge Public Works Director Siobhan Foster and her staff for the expert advice and assistance in bringing this grant application to a successful conclusion.

The Department of Transportation is pleased to announce that the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) awarded the City of Pasadena the 2013 Blue Diamond Award. The Blue Diamond Award is awarded by Metro each year to the corporation or agency with the most outstanding employee rideshare program. The City's employee rideshare program, known as the Prideshare Program, has been recognized by Metro in previous years but took the top award for Los Angeles County this year. Vice Mayor Robinson attended the awards event and was presented the Blue Diamond Award with Oskar Molina and Nina Chen who operate the Prideshare Program.

The City's Prideshare Program encourages employees to reduce their commute trips by using modes other than driving alone to get to work. By carpooling, vanpooling, riding a bike or walking to work employees are doing their part to achieve the environmental standards the City Council has set for the City. The Prideshare Program is funded through fees paid by City employees who drive solo to work. The program has consistently increased employee participation over the last few years. The program started its ninth employee vanpool earlier this month and hosted a successful Bike to Work Day event last month.



Another Pasadena employer also received a Diamond Award from Metro for their outstanding employee ridesharing program. Jones-Lang-LaSalle (Pasadena Towers) received the award for the most improved rideshare program in Los Angeles County. Jones-Lang-LaSalle increased the number of employees who rideshare to their offices by over 40 percent last year by encouraging their employees to carpool to work.

SUBJECT: **Careers in Conservation**

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The Careers in Conservation Program will kick off Tuesday, July 2, 2013 with sixteen students who currently attend Muir High School's Career Pathways Science, Technology and Engineering Academy. Together the City of Pasadena, Summer Rose Program and the County of Los Angeles Summer Youth Employment Program have created a paid educational opportunity for youth to obtain valuable on the job training through the "Careers and Conservation Program".

Students will work a total of (6) six weeks, 160 hours and be compensated \$8.40 per hour. Ten students will start at Eaton Canyon and six students at Hahamonga Park for 3 weeks. On the fourth week students will trade locations. Students assigned to Eaton Canyon will be provided instruction related to native plant irrigation, design and repair, ecosystem, park operations and maintenance and sustainable design for green buildings. Students will also attend field trips to Devil's Punchbowl, Palcerita Canyon, and Vasquez Rocks. Students assigned to Hahamonga Park will work with Outward Bound Adventures (OBA) staff to do similar projects at the site. At the conclusion of the six weeks, students will attend a three day, two night camping adventure in either the Santa Monica Mountains or Channel Islands.

"We're especially pleased to introduce this program with Muir High School students given the legacy left by conservationist and naturalist John Muir" said Mercy Santoro, Director of Human Services and Recreation. This project also supports the portion of the School/City Workplan which focuses on the School to Career Program.






Just ten miles north of downtown Los Angeles, the city of Pasadena is an arts and culture hub all its own.

There are more than a dozen museums here, each with a unique focus. European art is front and center at the Norton Simon Museum, including works by Van Gogh, Degas, Rembrandt, and Picasso, while the Pacific Asia Museum showcases Japanese paintings, Chinese ceramics, and Buddhist pieces. For something a little closer to home, the Pasadena Museum of California Art is dedicated exclusively to the art, architecture, and design of the Golden State; head to its third-floor terrace for unbeatable views, too. And over at The Huntington, located on the 207-acre estate of railroad tycoon Henry Huntington, you'll find a collection of rare books, three art galleries, and sprawling gardens.

On the performing arts front, check the schedules for the Pasadena Civic Auditorium, Boston Court Performing Arts Center, and the theaters at Caltech. See who's taking the stage at the 1917 Pasadena Playhouse, where Gene Hackman and Dustin Hoffman got their start. Or, check out *A Noise Within*, where dramatic productions star professional, classically trained performers.

What else is there to do in Pasadena? Bring your walking shoes and stroll the city's shopping and entertainment districts that wind across town. Don't miss the 22-block Old Pasadena neighborhood, filled with hundreds of boutiques, galleries, and restaurants. Then head to the 132-acre Arroyo Seco recreational area, home to the famous Rose Bowl Stadium. Built in 1922, it hosts the Rose Bowl college football game each New Year's Day — preceded by the city's iconic Rose Parade — and is currently undergoing a \$180 million facelift just in time for January's 100th Rose Bowl Game and the BCS National Championship game. And you won't go hungry in Pasadena, birthplace of Julia Child: There are more than 500 restaurants (more per capita than New York City). Bon appétit!


### The Huntington Library, Art Collections, and Botanical Gardens

This world-renowned research and cultural center is surrounded by 120 acres of breathtaking gardens. Originally the private estate of railroad magnate Henry Huntington, it's one of Southern California's "must-see" cultural destinations with magnificent collections of rare books, manuscripts, and priceless works of art.

Among the highlights are Gainsborough's *The Blue Boy*, a Gutenberg Bible, and an illuminated manuscript of Chaucer's *The Canterbury Tales*. Wander through 12 gardens, including the Japanese, Rose, Desert, Camellia, Shakespeare, and Children's gardens. The newest addition is a classical Chinese garden,

the Garden of Flowing Fragrance, with pavilions and bridges surrounding a large lake. The research library attracts scholars for advanced humanities research.






“**T**he Little Old Lady from Pasadena’s” sleepy city has transformed itself into one of Southern California’s most vibrant, sophisticated urban areas. Mansion, once owned by William Wrigley, Jr., is now home to the Pasadena Tournament of Roses. Other notable homes include Greene & Greene’s Blacker House, Frank Lloyd Wright’s Millard House, and Ernest A. Batchelder’s House.

Today Pasadena is a pedestrian-friendly city made up of a patchwork of shopping and entertainment districts that form a continuous corridor across the city. Fashionistas can shop ‘til they drop in Old Pasadena, a hip 22-

block area filled with 200 one-of-a-kind boutiques, name brand retailers, galleries, antique havens, restaurants, and clubs. More retail therapy can be found in the historical Playhouse District and on tree-lined South Lake Avenue.

RE: Status of the Rose Bowl Local Participation Plan

Consistent with the Rose Bowl Local Participation Plan (Plan) adopted by the Rose Bowl Operating Company on February 17, 2011, the Department of Finance facilitated all deliverables with the following results.

1. Contractors working on the Rose Bowl Renovation and Tenant Improvement Project employed 234 Pasadena residents representing \$2,330,682 in wages which is over 10 percent of the total wages for the project.
2. There has been \$6,105,018 in local spending reported by Rose Bowl staff and \$3,939,450 in contracting and procurement reported by the contractors.
3. All inclusive, these numbers represent a total of \$12,375,150 in local benefit to Pasadena.

Staff continues to work with the remaining contractors to provide outreach support and ongoing tracking and reporting according to the Plan. As the project winds down, staff will prepare a final report which will include lessons learned and final numbers.
