1. FY 2015 CIP Discussions Begin on Monday, May 5th:

There will be a joint Finance Committee/City Council meeting at 1:00 pm in the Council Chambers next Monday deliberations of the FY 2015 -2019 Capital Improvement Program Budget. The departments will present each of the categories in detail and discuss what is being recommended for funding in the coming fiscal year. The categories that will be covered on Monday include:

- Water
- Electric
- Street Lighting & Electrical System Undergrounding
- Technology
- RBOC
- PCOC

2. Proposed Rate Change Town Hall Meeting:

Pasadena Water and Power (PWP) has proposed rate changes to PWP's electric rates that are necessary to recover the costs of providing the Pasadena community with safe, reliable, and sustainable power. In effort to explain the how electric rates are determined, discuss the proposed electric rate increases for 2014, and describe programs and services to help residents save money and energy; PWP, along with Mayor Bill Bogaard, will be hosting a community-wide "Town Hall" event on Thursday, May 22, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the Forum at All Saints Church located at 132 N. Euclid Ave.

According to Phyllis Currie, General Manager, PWP will have a "Bill Estimator" on hand to help the public estimate what the impacts of the proposed rate changes and the first 50 PWP customers to arrive will receive a free energy-saving LED light bulb. Customers who attend the event are encouraged to bring their latest bill to the meeting.

3. FY 2013-2014 MASH Trainees Permanent Job Placements Update as of April 7, 2014:

The MASH Program is on track to achieve its best results ever for permanent job placements of program trainees who are long term unemployed adults. The program has historically topped out at approximately 10 permanent job placements per year. However, with three months left in FY 2013-2014, the MASH Program has seen 18 of its trainees successfully transition into permanent "high road" jobs (generally considered to be jobs with livable wages and benefits).

One success story is that of Pasadena resident, Arvie Johnson, came to MASH with over 30 years of management experience from the Periodical Distribution Industry where he managed a team of over 35 people. In March 2012, Mr. Johnson was hired with MASH as a trainee and later went on to cross-train in the Parks and Natural Resources Division within the City of Pasadena's Public Works Department. Because of his hard work, dedication and solid work ethic, Mr. Johnson was hired as a full-time Maintenance Assistant in April 2014.

I have attached a memorandum from William Huang, Director of Housing and Career Services which provides additional detailed information on the concerted efforts to expand the pool of employment opportunities beyond City of Pasadena departments and the recent hires of 18 placed trainees.

4. Completion of Green Street and Fair Oaks Avenue Improvement Project:

Siobhan Foster, Director of Public Works is excited to announce the successful completion of \$260,000 of improvements to Green Street from De Lacey Avenue to Fair Oaks Avenue and to Fair Oaks Avenue from Union Street to Green Street. Construction started in March 2014 and was recently complete in April 2014. The City of Pasadena contracted with Excel Paving Company to perform the infrastructure improvements project. The attached memorandum and photo provides detailed information on the completed project.

5. New Finance Guide:

Pasadena Water & Power (PWP) is constantly looking for ways to empower the City's residents and businesses to conserve water and energy. In an effort to address the financial hurdles that many residents and businesses face when trying to complete sustainable projects, PWP partnered with California Center for Sustainable Energy (CCSE) to create a "Clean Energy Finance Guide."

This finance guide is a quick reference resource to assist PWP customers in navigating the financing options available to support energy efficiency and renewable energy projects. According to Phyllis Currie, General Manager, Water and Power, the guidebook has programs for residential, commercial and municipal building owners and contractors. Each financing product available to our community is outlined in this guidebook, a general description and contact information is provided for each financing product or program, along with financing terms and eligible measures. PWP and CCSE

will update the guidebook annually, but customers are encouraged to contact the financing provider for complete and up-to-date information and participation details.

The development of PWP's Clean Energy Finance Guide leverages grant-funded work performed by CCSE as part of the SunShot Initiative Southern California Rooftop Solar Challenge, a Department of Energy (DOE) program to stimulate adoption of solar energy by reducing barriers and lowering installation costs. 6. Notice of Specified Event:

On April 28, 2014, the Department of Finance provided the attached "Notice of Specified Event" to the Electronic Municipal Market Access (EMMA) in accordance to the S.E.C Rule 15c2-12. This notice relates to information on certain litigation matters and the proposed initiative to repeal the utility users' tax which actions might impact the bond issues listed in the report.

Additionally, in early April, the City was informed by Standard & Poor's Rating Agency that it has updated its methodology and assumptions for assigning issuer credit ratings and issue credit ratings based on general obligation pledges of local governments in the United States. This criteria applies to all U. S. local governments issuer credit ratings and issue ratings on general obligation bonds issued by municipal governments that are not special purpose districts. According to Andrew Green Director of Finance, the Department expects the City of Pasadena's rating by S & P within the next few weeks.

7. Bob Hope Airport Banner Contest Winner 2014:

The Arts and Culture Commission has selected the winning entry of student artwork for the 7th annual Bob Hope Airport "**Tower Banner**" Contest. Each year, high school students from Pasadena, Burbank and Glendale are invited by the Airport Authority to submit their artwork designs in competition for exhibition on the Airport's historic airport tower. According to Vincent Bertoni, Director of Planning and Community Development, the three winning banner designs, one from each school district, will each be exhibited for three months to an audience of over a million travelers and airport visitors. This year's contest theme was "**Skies of Freedom.**" A \$3,000 award is given to each participating school district to support and promote arts education programs.

8. Parks & Natural Resources – Tree Removal List:





RE: Completion of Green Street and Fair Oaks Avenue Improvement Project

The Department of Public Works is excited to announce the successful completion of \$260,000 of improvements to Green Street from De Lacey Avenue to Fair Oaks Avenue and to Fair Oaks Avenue from Union Street to Green Street. Construction started in March 2014 and was recently completed in April 2014.

The City of Pasadena contracted with Excel Paving Company to perform the infrastructure improvements project. The project consists of:

- Replacement of existing 10-inch sewer pipe with a new 12-inch pipe on Green Street;
- Reconstruction of intersection curb ramps and retrofitting existing ramps with detectable warning surfaces;
- Installation of colored stamped asphalt crosswalks;
- Pavement resurfacing; and
- Installation of permanent traffic striping and markings.

The Department of Public Works implemented a comprehensive project communication plan to inform and keep businesses, residents, Old Pasadena Management District, motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians who normally traversed this area up-to-date about project status through the use of changeable message signs and other communication tools.

Specified Event:

Update on Certain Litigation Relating to Water Fund Transfers. On September 30, 2013, a complaint was filed in Los Angeles Superior Court against the City of Pasadena, challenging the legality of transfers of funds from the Water Fund to the General Fund (as authorized by Section 1408 of the Charter) including transfers to support the Hahamonga Watershed Park operations. Specifically, the complaint alleges the City failed to comply with Proposition 218 because the funds would be used "for purposes other than providing water services such as general governmental services." The City has answered the complaint, which has been set for hearing on September 16, 2014. In Fiscal Year 2013, the City authorized the transfer of approximately \$3.3 million from the Water Fund to the General Fund. If the City were to ultimately be found to have violated Proposition 218 by transferring funds to the General Fund in excess of the cost the City bears to provide General Fund services to the Water Utility, the court may order the excess transfers restored to the Water Fund and may require reduction of future transfers. The City denies liability and is vigorously defending the case. The City has also set aside the FY2014

transfer, is not anticipating the revenues during the year, and is expected to still close the year with a positive net income for the General Fund.

Claim for Refund of Portion of Water Charges to Customers Outside City Limits. On

March 24, 2014, the City received a claim (numbered 12,137 by the City Clerk) from the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association on behalf of a purported class of customers of the City's water utility located outside City limits. The claim seeks a refund of "distribution and customer charges" and "commodity rates" paid within the twelve months preceding the City's receipt of this claim, and any additional amounts collected thereafter, to the extent such rates and charges exceed the cost of providing water service to claimants." The claim alleges that a 25% greater charge for these services to extra-territorial customers exceeds the City's cost to serve these customers and therefore violates Article XIII D, section 6 of the California Constitution. The City intends to deny the claim and litigation may follow. The City denies liability and will vigorously defend any litigation that results. In the 12 months prior to March 24, 2014, the City collected \$1.6 million in distribution and customer charges and commodity rates from extra-territorial customers.

Proposed Initiative to Repeal Utility Users Tax. On February 8, 2008 City voters approved Measure D to ratify and continue this tax and to clarify the application of the telephone tax to cellular and other new technologies. On April 15, 2014 proponents of an initiative measure to repeal the City's tax on bills telephone (8.28%), electric (7.67%), gas (7.9%), water (7.67%) and cable (9.4%) services consumed in the City submitted petitions to the City Clerk for the proposal. The petitions bore 2,344 signatures, which exceed the 2,194 signatures required to qualify the measure for the ballot. The Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters is verifying that these signatures meet the requirements of the Elections Code. Some fraction of the signatures can be expected to be invalidated and it is not clear whether the measure will qualify for the ballot. If the County Registrar does determine that the petitions bear 2,194 valid signatures, the City Council will be obliged to place the measure on the March 10, 2015 general municipal election ballot. If a simple majority of City voters voting on the question approve the measure, it would take effect 10 days after the election. For the 2013-14 fiscal year, approximately \$31 million is estimated to be received from utility users tax revenue.

Update on SB481 litigation:

On December 18, 2012, the Department of Finance of the State of California (DOF) notified the City of Pasadena and its former redevelopment agency's Successor Agency that Items 1 (SB 481 Pension Payment Obligations) and 14 (SB 481 Affordable Housing Obligations) have been determined by DOF to not be enforceable obligations under the redevelopment dissolution act (commonly known as AB 26) and to not be eligible for payment from former tax increment generated by the redevelopment projects (known as Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund, or RPTTF, funding). Previously the DOF, by letter dated June 29, 2012 had found both such items to be enforceable obligations and had found both such items to be eligible for payment from RPTTF funding. There have been no changes in facts or circumstances relating to such items between June 29, 2012 and December 18, 2012. This action was taken by letter from the Department of Finance dated December 18, 2012.


On December 28, 2012, the City filed litigation in the Superior Court of the State of California and applied for a temporary restraining order so that the RPTTF funds would be made available (for payment of Items 1 and 14), as required by applicable statutory validation, judicial validation and application of law, and to restrain the distribution of these funds on January 2, 2013 to other property tax agencies. City of Pasadena Successor vs. Ana Matosantos Director of the State of California Department of Finance, Case No. 34-2012-000134585-CU-MC-GDS. The City has prevailed thus far by first obtaining a Temporary Restraining Order and, more recently, a Preliminary Injunction which declare Items 1 (SB 481 Pension Payment Obligations) and 14 (SB 481 Affordable Housing Obligations) as obligations of the former redevelopment agency due to the City as valid enforceable obligations payable by the successor agency.

The Department of Finance, through the State Attorney General's Office, filed its Notice of Appeal of the Preliminary Injunction on March 11, 2013. On September 12, 2013 the Attorney General's Office filed its opening brief. The City's Opposition Brief was filed on November 12, 2013. The Attorney General's Office's reply brief was filed on January 21, 2014. The Court of Appeal requested additional briefing from both parties and those letter briefs were both submitted as of April 13, 2014. The Court of Appeal has not yet set an expedited hearing date pursuant to a previously granted application for an expedited hearing and has not issued any ruling on the case.

Further legal proceedings will follow in the coming months.

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

FORWARD PROGRESS

Summary of Rose Bowl Stadium renovation project


The Rose Bowl renovation project began January 2011 and has been carried out in four phases over five years. And now, the Rose Bowl Operating Company (RBOC) is nearing the final stage of renovation within the stadium and in immediate concourse area. The project elements include:

- Renovate Press Box structure, the Pavilion
- Improve stadium exiting by widening up to 12 tunnels and additional exit aisles
- Repair existing concrete decking with waterproof topping
- Modify bench seating on the north and south to fit the widened aisles
- Reconfigure field wall locations
- Provide new field 'concourse' access to stadium seating
- Provide new field hedge barrier (east and west sidelines)
- Provide new LED HD format video board with six new LED advertising panels at stadium rim on north end
- Recall existing 1940s vintage scoreboard at south end and provide six LED advertising panels at stadium rim
- Provide new LED advertising and LED game information board at east side of the stadium
- Add new, renovate existing restrooms and concession stands
- Provide up to eight new stadium entry gates and fencing
- Modify existing fence line
- Provide new landscaping
- Upgrade electrical service and utility loop
- Provide new storm drain connected to bio-swale at south end of facility





Local hire update

An important aspect of the Rose Bowl Renovation project has been the local hire effort. Using past “major” projects of similar size and scope, it was estimated that the project would generate between 75 and 100 jobs for Pasadena residents.



As of March 25, 2014, 243 Pasadena residents have been hired by contractors for a total of \$2,405,565 in wages paid, which is 10.1% of the total payroll, and 78,175 hours worked by Pasadena residents. Additionally, \$4,076,125 has been paid in local procurement and subcontracting, as reported by the contractors.

The RBOC staff reports a total of \$6,633,310 in direct local business project expenditures. This makes the Rose Bowl renovation one of the most successful projects to date benefiting Pasadena residents.

LA GALAXY VS. MANCHESTER UNITED AT THE ROSE BOWL ON JULY 23

The Rose Bowl Stadium's soccer legacy continues when Manchester United meets the LA Galaxy in an International Friendly Match, Wednesday, July 23 at 7 p.m.

Manchester United is one of the world's most recognized clubs due to their success in England and in European competition. They have won 20 English First Division titles, a record 11 FA Cup titles, four Football League Cups, three European Cups, one UEFA SuperCup, and one FIFA Club World Cup.

Manchester United Group Managing Director Richard Arnold is looking forward to the upcoming game. "Playing LA Galaxy at the world-famous Rose Bowl Stadium will be an important part of the team's preparations for the 2014/15 football season. The Club has been visiting Los Angeles since 1950 and this match provides a great opportunity for us to engage with our fans in this region," he said.



LA Galaxy President Chris Klein said "We look forward to playing a storied club at a storied venue. As the top club in North America it is important for us to play big games and bring big events to the city of Los Angeles. "We are excited to take on Manchester United at the Rose Bowl Stadium this summer."



The Rose Bowl Stadium served as the home of the LA Galaxy from 1996-2002. The Rose Bowl is the only stadium in the world to have hosted both a men's and women's World Cup final. The stadium hosted the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic men's soccer final, the 1994 FIFA World Cup final, the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup final, 2002 and 2011 CONCACAF Gold Cup finals as well as a 2013 CONCACAF Gold Cup group stage doubleheader. And it hosted an Olympic gold medal match as well.

RIHANNA, EMINEM TO ROCK OUT AT THE ROSE BOWL

Superstars' "Monster Tour" kicks off August 7

Two of music's biggest superstars, Rihanna and Eminem, will be joining forces for a three-city concert tour, "The Monster Tour." And they will kick it off at the Rose Bowl Stadium on Thursday, August 7.

Due to overwhelming demand, Rihanna and Eminem have announced a second date in Los Angeles for The Monster Tour. The two superstars will now perform on August 7 and August 8 at the Rose Bowl Stadium.

Rihanna is one of the hottest acts in the country, selling over 30 million albums and 120 million singles worldwide, with thirteen #1 singles, making her one of the best-selling artists of all time. Eminem is one of the most well-known hip hop artists, as well as one of the best-selling, with over 80 million albums and 120 million singles sold worldwide.

Although the two stars are very well known for their individual songs and albums over the years, the song "The Monster" has helped the two become even more popular as a duo. Both of Eminem and Rihanna's collaborated singles, "Monster" and "Love the Way You Lie," have topped the charts.

ONE DIRECTION FOR ROSE BOWL REVENUES

Live Nation sending the Stadium in a good direction with knock-out concert bookings

April 22 the Pasadena City Council approved the addition of another Live Nation event at the Rose Bowl Stadium — a Jay-Z & Beyonce concert, tentatively titled the "Mr. and Mrs. Carter Tour." Rose Bowl General Manager and CEO Darryl Dunn said that the stadium is still in negotiations with promoter Live Nation for the concert and that "nothing has been finalized" yet. The date being discussed is Saturday, August 2.

After their booking of an unprecedented third concert for the hot new boy band, One Direction, Live Nation booked rapper Eminem and pop singer Rihanna's "Monster Tour" into the Rose Bowl Stadium to launch their three-city tour. These Live Nation bookings have started the ball rolling toward a brighter financial future for the stadium.

If revenues can be increased and sustained, the Rose Bowl Stadium should achieve the solid financial footing the RBOC has long pursued. Certainly, music promoter Live Nation is doing its part.

Dunn is optimistic and very pleased. "It's great. The Monster booking is notable because there are only three shows on this tour. "I think this is going to be huge for businesses and hotels just because we are the only venue west of Detroit. I do anticipate this being a really high demand event. And then there is the Jay Z and Beyonce concert. This is huge." And, he expects the concerts to generate at least \$400,000 in revenues per concert.

Music events are part of the stadium's new strategy to keep the stadium financially viable while foregoing the possibility of temporarily hosting a National Football League team. Earlier in the year the Pasadena City Council approved a total of 18 large events in 2014, which is more than the City ordinance limit of 12 allowed without council consent.

FESTIVAL ANNOUNCEMENT!

City explores plans for Rose Bowl music festival

Rose Bowl officials announced April 10 that they are exploring the possibility of holding an annual weekend music festival at the Rose Bowl Stadium.

According to a letter, which was signed by Mayor Bogaard and RBOC Board Chair Victor Gordo and distributed by e-mail to prominent members of the business and residential communities, the festival would include "top-quality acts performing on multiple stages inside the Rose Bowl Stadium and on a portion of the Brookside Golf Course." The festival would also include food, art and cultural programming.

The letter cited the need for the Rose Bowl "to continue to explore adding events which are consistent with our quality of life and culture, and which can support our local economy, and the long term financial stability" of the Rose Bowl stadium.

Rose Bowl CEO and General Manager Darryl Dunn said that the stadium is in talks with various “world-class” promoters, to develop a festival that would attract a following and generate significant revenue for the stadium and the community at large.

The city is not planning to create another Coachella. For example, to make the event more manageable for the nearby Arroyo neighborhoods, no camping would be allowed. For a Pasadena event, Dunn said, “We would seek to develop a multi-generational festival that offers quality entertainment in a safe and inviting setting, which aligns with our community standards, and the quality we expect.”

An important element of the process will be an environmental impact report in the early planning stage of the festival. Dunn said city staffs have begun the preliminary study, and officials will go to City Council in the next month to ask for funding for an environmental impact report. The city would likely pay for the EIR up front but then negotiate with the chosen promoter on repayment.

Should the music event become a reality hosting an NFL team at the Rose Bowl would be off the table. “It would be one or the other,” Dunn said.
